#### **MESSAGE FROM PASTOR STANTON**



THERE WERE NO voice recorders in the 1500s, so we don't know whether Luther really said it or whether it is simply

attributed to him, but here's the quote so many love, "Even if I knew that tomorrow the world would go to pieces, I would still plant my apple tree." It is a hope-filled statement of defiance in the face of certain hopelessness. It would look foolish to the world. But... it is also an act of faith. That even amidst a 'world going to pieces' there will be a time when apples will come in handy.

In May of 2020, we stay at home amidst a world that is fracturing into pieces. Our state's politics are certainly shattered beyond any form of compromise. We have dozens of members, extended family and friends

whose jobs are broken. Many of us have been furloughed, laid off or completely let go. And although COVID-19 hasn't hit our community hard yet—well done social distancers!—the specter of a pandemic looms large over every part of life. In just a matter of weeks, the economy, public health and our way of life has been reduced. The world has gone to pieces. And it will stay in pieces for some time to come. Luther would still plant his apple tree. What do we do?

We worship. Since we began livestreaming our worship, our 'attendance' has grown. I'm not sure how to count how many people are watching us. Nobody is. But we are choosing to add up our 'peak views' from each platform and multiply that by 2.5. So, for

who are loving their way through this unprecedented time. I think of my grandparents often, members of what is called the Greatest Generation. I wonder what they would say and think and do. I think they would be afraid but would pull on their experiences of war and tell us we do this thing together, it is the only way. We pull together, we encourage each other through the fear and we sacrifice things we never considered sacrificing—like our ability to move freely around the world, our vanity, our wealth or our way of life.

We are not a people used to having to sacrifice much. Sure, there are things we choose to go without, or there may

example, during a sermon our Facebook number (the number in the upper left corner) hits 183. Add the number of views from watching on our website, and the Twitter number and we can guess at how many people at least checked in for a moment with us. In our second Sunday we had 270 x 2.5 = 675. Palm Sunday: 271 (677). Easter: 380 (950)! Holy Week saw no service with fewer than 102 devices connected to our stream at once. If we are right, that the average device has 2.5 people watching, that's at least 255 streaming each night of Holy Week. That's incredible! When we meet in person, we don't typically see 100 individuals in our sanctuary on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

We give. In the first two months and two weeks of 2020—when the stock market remained near 30,000 and unemployment was at an all-time low, First Lutheran had fallen behind by more than \$20,000 when compared to 2019. In the two weeks after we suspended gatherings, it got much worse (understandably; those who are not on electronic giving had only one way of making their offering: mail, so much got delayed). But since the last week of March, while the world has thrown so many scary things at all of us, our giving has not only met budget. The Finance team expects we will put a substantial dent in that \$20,000 hole we dug in January and February. PLUS, gifts continue to stream in to the "Our Church + Our Time" capital campaign fund. In May we expect to hit \$900,000 of actual gifts received. First's total pledge is something like \$1,030,000. That means we have eight months to not only hit our pledge number but, hopefully, exceed that number by enough to finish off our final few (big ticket) projects like paying off the mortgage, resurfacing the education wing floors and building a new Main Street sign.

We serve. How many masks have our sisters and brothers in Christ made? How many hours have we given to the Warming Center downtown? Our neighbor to neighbor program has connectors checking in with all families to see what prayer concerns are out there: what needs do people have? We are planning to still host a blood drive. We are seeking people who don't have access to our livestream so that we can 'hook them up' (by the way... if you or someone you know needs a device or help connecting to our website so that you can engage in worship, LET ME KNOW. First's foundation has offered money to pay for devices, WiFi and

anything else that's needed so that ALL can access the stream). And we've got more ideas brewing to meet financial needs, food scarcity and more. Servant hearts are not darkened by pandemic!

The world has gone to pieces. And it will stay in pieces for some time to come. Luther would still plant his apple tree. What do **we** do? We worship, we give and we serve for starters. And for all the ways you are helping this fellowship grow, THANK YOU. First Lutheran will emerge (slowly) from this stay-at-home time different than we were before. And in almost every way, the difference will be improvements. All because while the world went to pieces, we never forgot what keeps us whole: the grace and love of God.

### LIVE STREAM UPDATE



Many of our Lenten small groups finished discussing Waking Up White via Zoom meetings and our year round groups, staff meetings and Vision & Leadership meetings are all happening utilizing Zoom. It's so important to stay connected with others while we are staying safe at home. I encourage you to give it a try.

Zoom is a two way video conferencing system where you can both see and hear the people you are talking with. You can use your smart cell phone. tablet or computer. If you don't have a smartphone, you can still connect over the phone, but you won't be able to see everyone in the group. The organizer of the meeting will send a meeting link to the participants, as well as a phone number for folks who want to dial in. When you click on the link, you will be asked to allow Zoom to open, then you will be in the meeting. If you dial into the meeting with your phone, you will be asked to enter the meeting ID number, then you will be in the meeting.

Anyone can set up a Zoom meeting for free and the meeting can last up to 40 minutes. The church has a paid account which we use for our small groups, etc. which generally go longer than the 40 minutes. Give it a try! If you are interested in having a Zoom meeting with your "church people," contact bridget@firstlu.org to get connected. If you are interested in using Zoom to interact with family and friends and need help, you can contact Bridget as well.

IN THE PAST six weeks
First Lutheran has shown
what is means to be
church. How we are the
church may have changed,

but who we are as a church has not. So much continued to happen and needed to be communicated, that I completely forgot to promote in the April newsletter our move to live streaming!

So first, the how-to: A good starting point is our website. The easiest way to find our live streaming page is to **go to**1stlu.org/live. On this page you'll find several things, but the main thing is this: you can actually watch the live stream right there, on our site. No need to have an account on another social media platform, the live stream is right there for you to watch. But part of worship is the social aspect of it, so if you do have an account on Facebook or YouTube, you might want to watch there, as you can chat with other members who are watching.

That's another thing you'll find at 1stlu.org/live: a list of all the options of where to watch. Currently we are trying to broadcast to our site, to Facebook, to YouTube, to Twitter/Periscope, and to Boxcast. So not only can you use their website for watching the live stream, you can also use their apps on your phone or tablet. Some of them even have apps on smart TVs, so you could check those out as well; search for "First Lutheran Onalaska" and make certain to follow us on those platforms so you are alerted when we go live.

It's nice to have options, because some platforms don't always work, whether they are struggling to keep up with demand on a given Sunday morning, or if someone flagged our stream as "inappropriate" (that happened to us on YouTube a couple

weeks in). So if you are having issues with one platform, try another one.

In addition to watching the live stream at our usual worship times, you can also watch them on demand later in the week. Again, you have some options: previous services can be found on our site at 1stlu.org/live, under the embedded video player in a list titled "Related Videos." There are also archives on Facebook and YouTube.

For a short historical rundown: we first tried a service called Castr.io until they failed to rebroadcast to YouTube (but lots of platforms were struggling that week). We then tried Restream.io. We then tried Vimeo, as they offered scheduling options. Lastly, we appear to be settling on Boxcast, which is proving to be even easier to work with. There might be a couple more changes yet, but I think we are getting close to figuring this out.

Keep in mind: the live streaming at First Lutheran is a ministry. And to that end, it will need members to help it continue. Just as we need members to lead worship by running the projection slides, we will need someone to run the video switching required for the live stream. Training will be provided; it will be a great way to serve and help First reach everyone who is out of town or who is homebound. (Which is currently all of us!)

#### **5 WAYS TO PREPARE FOR DIGITAL WORSHIP**

SO YOU AND many others are now worshiping digitally because of an order from your governor to Shelter in Place, Stay at Home, Quarantine or, my

personal favorite, Hoosier Hunker Down. (Well done, Indiana.) These restrictions affect not just worship but small group meetings and Bible studies, council meetings and youth group activities. Much, perhaps most, of this life during COVID-19 is digital right now.

Soon, though, the novelty may wear off.

Now that we've been sheltering in place for a month, there's a danger of losing both our connectivity to one another and our commitment to continuing this practice in these limited ways. How can you foster feelings of connection with God, with your community and with the worship experience? How can worship remain a priority for you not just in theory but in practice?

Preparation now matters more than ever. Many congregations, when they gather, hear a leader say, "Prepare your hearts and minds for worship." Now, though, we're called beyond hearts and minds. We're called to prepare

hearths and selves, the physical spaces of our homes and the bodies we bring to digital worship. Below are five suggestions for magnifying your experience of digital worship.

First, though, a disclaimer: This isn't advice for how to create the best technological experience. There's value in the right sound settings, turning your microphone off and the like, but this is about the space in which your technology is set and how to more fully engage worship in that place.

#### 1. SET (AND CHOOSE) THE SPACE

If you're having trouble feeling like you're at worship, take a look around. Are there dirty clothes strewn across the couch? Dirty dishes on the table? Garbage bags waiting to be taken out? Don't get me wrong, those are all realities in my house! But they often distract me when I'm trying to engage in reflective and attentive worship. So we've set aside our guest bedroom as a space where we don't leave messes, where we clean and organize regularly, where we try to align the feeling of the space with the purpose of worship.

Not that God needs a tidy space, but removing distractions helps us to focus ourselves more on holy purposes. If you don't have a bedroom to spare, prioritize a corner of the kitchen table or a section of the family room to set in order and prioritize worship for at least the time that you're planning to worship.

#### 2. UTILIZE IMAGES

Art is a vital element of worship. Since the earliest Christian gatherings, words, images and artifacts have played central roles. Of course, the words of Scripture, both the Hebrew Bible and the New Testament, exemplify various kinds of linguistic art: poetry and narrative, song and prose

and advice. Soon, paintings, drawings and, eventually, icons became central parts of the church's worship.

Many elements, such as the altar and candlesticks, as well as the cup and plate (also known as the chalice and paten) of communion, contain types of decorating, from the simple to the ornate. For your own space, consider projecting or printing your favorite religious image that raises up community—an icon of Jesus and the disciples, for instance—to help focus you on Christ and his community. Consider hanging a cross and displaying your favorite Bible, open to your favorite passage.

#### 3. REMEMBER YOUR BAPTISM

One way to mark an entrance into worship is to splash yourself with holy water. Many churches place the baptismal font at the main entrance, to signify baptism's role as the traditional entrance into Christian community. Whenever I pass a font in the church, I dip my finger in the water and mark a sign of the cross on my head.

Consider, then, as you prepare for digital worship events, wetting your hand and marking your forehead with the cross of Christ. Do you have a favorite decorative bowl? Consider fusing the art and the baptismal remembrance by filling the bowl and bringing it into the space you've set aside.

#### 4. LIGHT UP YOUR WORLD

Most churches utilize candles in some way. Originally, this was the only way to light a home at night. Eventually, candles lit large temples and then catacombs for worship. With the advent of electricity, candles became more theologically useful. The lighting of candles signified God's presence, particularly in the places where the

holiest things happened: around altars, pulpits and the font. One candle, the Paschal Candle, is lit to symbolize Christ's presence.

In your home-based worship space, light a candle to signify the presence of God with you, in your home. The warmth of the flame may remind you of God's comfort and the flickering light of God's constant movement.

#### **5. SING IT LOUD, SAY IT PROUD!**

Once worship begins, whether you're by yourself or with family, it can feel a bit awkward to join in litanies, to pray aloud or to sing along the way you would in the sanctuary with your church. Remember, though, that worship is inherently participatory.

So when you pray, pray with fervor. Let the words resonate from deep within you. When you sing, do it, as John Wesley said, "lustily and with good courage!" (Yes, he really said that and I agree.) Shout to the Lord with joy and passion. There's no shame in passionate worship, no matter if you're surrounded by hundreds, gathered with dozens or alone behind a screen, connected to the community through the internet.

#### **MESSAGE FROM BISHOP JIM ARENDS**

### DOORS FAITHFULLY CLOSED

THE GOVERNORS OF Wisconsin and Minnesota have extended their Safer In Home orders. They are weathering protestors on

their lawns demanding the states be reopened. They are listening to conservative members of their statehouses who want churches to be freed. And it will get worse.

We have to know our stay at home lives have made a difference. Our two states have so far avoided the spike and flattened the curve. And so we ask, "Isn't it all better now?"

No, it is not. New cases of corona virus continue. More deaths from this pandemic continue. Doctors, immunologists and researchers tell us the virus is still a clear and present danger.

Yet, church goers, spurred on by the "it's better" news are getting antsy to bring their church families bak together on Sunday morning. And I am getting the question, "Will the bishop allow us to reopen our churches for worship? Or will he force us to keep things locked up?"

Well, first of all, in our Evangelical Lutheran Church in America polity the bishop cannot keep congregations out of their churches. But this bishop urges, with all the authority and influence he can muster, that our congregations follow the lead of our elected leaders. To not do so is foolish in the least and unfaithful at its worst.

Unfaithful?!?!?! YES!!!!!

As followers of Jesus, guided by the Living Word of God, we heed the leadership of our government. Unless

It would be foolish to ignore their wisdom because we "feel' things are better and we "want" our "freedom" back. As Jesus people faithfully thank God for the wisdom, meant to protect us, that is now guiding our leaders as they aim us toward health.

As followers of Jesus. God's embodied wisdom, we willingly limit our corporate worship for the sake of the least of these. Over and over again. Jesus holds up care for those in most need. Jesus now tells us to not put the vulnerable in need. We don't know who might bring the virus to worship. We don't know who might be exposed. And we don't take the chance—the foolish risk. Instead, we follow Jesus, freely practicing our faith in ways that don't need any church space. As Jesus did, we take time in scripture. As Jesus did, we set aside time to pray. As Jesus did, we tell the old, old story of God's active love in the world. We share our Living Lord with our loved ones, our children, our friends on the phone, in loving notes, on social media. We faithfully touch others with God's love at a time that we cannot physically touch others.

If this bishop could demand anything, I'd ask an end to foolish risks and selfish demands.

If this bishop could demand anything, I'd call for the faithful way. I'd call us to love the Lord our God, with all our hearts and minds and souls. I'd make sure we truly loved our neighbors as ourselves. For Jesus sake.

La Crosse County Health Department has partnered with The Hunger Task Force of La Crosse, La Crosse's only FREE and LOCAL food bank, providing free food to 91 food pantries, meal sites and youth programs in La Crosse County alone.

The Hunger Task Force and the programs that they serve play a vital role right now in providing food to those who are struggling as the number of food-insecure people continues to increase. Many community members served by their partner programs already live paycheck to paycheck and they are seeing more area residents lose their income entirely because of COVID-19 related lay-offs.

That's why the La Crosse County Health Department is teaming up with iFeed. Rotary and Rotary Lights to hold "Food Drive Fridays," a drive-thru style food drive where donors don't get out of their vehicles.

Collections are every Friday from 11am-1pm through the end of May. (May 1, 8, 15, 22, 29). Locations include:

- · Valley View Mall parking lot (by former Macy's location), 3800 Hwy 16. La Crosse
- · Downtown La Crosse: La Crosse County parking lot behind the Courthouse & Law Enforcement Center, 333 Vine St. La Crosse
- Southside La Crosse: Big Lots parking lot at 3960 Mormon Coulee Rd. La Crosse

Non-perishable foods are running dangerously low at The Hunger Task Force, and with the postponement of the National Letter Carriers' Stamp Out Hunger food drive, they are in desperate need of canned goods for the programs they serve. Canned items needed include meats (tuna, chicken). peanut butter, soup, fruit, boxed side dishes (stuffing, rices, potatoes), breakfast items (cereal, oatmeal, etc). canned ravioli & spaghettios, pasta & pasta sauce. We believe that everyone deserves to have access to food and essentials, especially in times of uncertainty.

AS MEMBERS OF First Lutheran Church and through our financial gifts, we commit to bringing people into a relationship

with Jesus Christ. Through our unique place in our community and the size of our congregation, we are able reach out to people of all ages to make more disciples of Christ. During this pandemic, the outreach by members has reached new heights. We have more than 70 people making regular phone calls to members of the congregation to see if they are all right and if they need anything. We have 15 people running errands, picking up prescriptions or doing grocery shopping. Many members are calling elderly neighbors to check on them, make bread, get groceries or buy pizza. Our guilters and others are making masks, gowns and surgical caps. Kids

and adults are using Zoom, Face Time and Facebook Messenger to chat, play games and maybe just be silly. We are Changing Lives Together. We are enthusiastically loving our neighbor through the work the Spirit has inspired us to do. We are living out Faith Alive! each and every day. Some of it is directed and managed by the church and some of it is simply about how we have chosen to live as faithful people.

At the end of March, we have received nearly 87% of the budgeted general fund income. Thank you to everyone for your continued generosity. Now is an excellent time to consider taking advantage of Simply Giving to ensure our many programs are able to Change more Lives. We have found streaming services and the pastors' musings are reaching many people in need of comfort during these times. Small groups are reaching

people confined at home through Zoom. Regular giving via Simply Giving can provide the resources to make this a permanent part of outreach to Change Lives. We can achieve this objective this year with an additional \$25,000. If you already participate in Simply Giving, thank you and please consider an increase to help make this video ministry happen. Capital Campaign update: It is great to report we have received over 82% of the pledged income for the capital campaign. It is our intent to complete this year's objectives of replacing the sanctuary roof (which is going to cost more than anticipated), replacing the educational wing flooring and paying off the mortgage. To achieve these objectives, it is essential all pledges are paid in full this year plus an additional \$100K is raised. Thank you for continuing to meet your pledge and considering an extra gift. Full financial details are available by request in the church office. In normal times, we welcome everyone to attend a finance committee meeting. We meet every month, on the second Wednesday, at noon. The Stewardship Committee meets once a month and is looking for members. For meeting times, contact Pastor Stanton.



# OUR CHURCH + OUR TIME CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE





THROUGH MARCH, THE people of First Lutheran have given more than \$92,000 to the capital campaign in 2020. That brings our total to

\$875,528. We have spent \$409,229 on a variety of needs from smoke alarms and a new education wing roof to landscaping and better WiFi coverage. In May, I am thrilled to say that a new roof will be installed on the sanctuary! Krause Konstruction has already begun on the south side. This is the same firm who put the last set of shingles on... 35 or more years ago! Our new roof will have steel shake shingles and will look great for generations to come. Plus, as we seek to be friendlier to the environment, we'll be improving our R-value (thermal resistance... we lose a LOT of heat through that roof) by about 1000%. That's not a typo. A ten fold increase.

THANK YOU to all who have

contributed to the capital campaign. The sanctuary roof is one of the last big projects left. Ás we close in on our pledged amount of \$1,058,518, we will celebrate by hopefully surpassing that expectation so that we can complete the education building floors, pay off the mortgage and maybe even build a new sign on Main Street. We have the opportunity to emerge from this pandemic debt free with most big ticket maintenance items taken care of so that we can continue to serve our community. There promises to be plenty of need. Thankfully, First Lutheran has plenty of generous, caring hearts.



From Mary: Todd Saner is a gift to all of us....... ♥





#### Unlocking Us by Brene Brown




