#### **MESSAGE FROM PASTOR STANTON**



First Lutheran's Vision & Leadership Team is reading a book this fall, recommended by our Stewardship Team, called *Not Your Parents'* 

Offering Plate written by J. Clif Christopher. Allow me the chance to offer a brief book report on the intro and first chapter...

Christopher says that over the course of the last 30-40 years, philanthropy has changed in America. In 2013 Americans gave away \$335 billion. 31% of that money was given to religious institutions. This is the lowest percentage ever recorded.

Secular charities (education, health, arts, environment, United Way and so on) have all shown increases. Only religion has failed to advance. "Now remember," Christopher says, "we are talking about a charity market share that at one time was at 60%. Today it is around 30%. Religion receives one-half of the charitable dollars in ratio to what it got thirty years ago."

I find that to be incredible! and unsurprising. The author goes on to assert that there are numerous reasons people's giving habits have changed. But one of the most important reasons

#### **MESSAGE FROM BISHOP EATON**

#### FEAR NOT

August 31, 2018



'm leaving for my first trip to Holden Village, a retreat center near Chelan, Wash. I've heard about this Lutheran Shangri-

La for years. I have sung and played the Holden Evening Prayer in many settings. I'm excited. The theme verse for the week I'll be in residence is "Fear not," which is part of a longer passage found in the book of Isaiah.

For me, Isaiah 43:1-7 is one of the most hopeful and lovely passages in all

of Scripture. This word of promise and grace comes to the people of God who are in exile in Babylon. It is difficult for many of us to imagine the intensity of these words and of the promise they contain. God's declaration that "you are mine... you are precious... and I love you" is almost too good to be true. Hearing and trusting this promise, the people were undoubtedly, as Zechariah says, "prisoners of hope."

"Fear not." "Do not fear." "Do not be afraid." "The fear of the Lord is the

is that churches do not do a good enough job at explaining how the church's work changes lives. Instead, churches get into a habit of offering a message that says something like, "Give us money because we need it— NOW!" and then the church wonders why it does not get more. Christopher's solution is for churches to take on a new mindset: justify your existence, explain how your ministry changes lives, compete for charitable donations, "earn people's gifts." Christopher believes we need to move from a mindset of telling people, "you should give" to answer the question our donors are asking us, "Why should I aive to YOU?"

I have yet to hear anyone who has read this book disagree with its premise or question the conclusions. Having just completed the 'ask' portion of the capital campaign last year, the question donors ask is fresh in my mind. "Why should I give to YOU?" This book is definitely speaking to us! As the YMCA, Humane Society, United Way, UWL and all kinds of other non-profits raise money for their projects, all of us are faced with limited resources with which we can be generous. So, why should I give to my church?

1. First Lutheran is the best source in the entire area for the proclamation of the good news of Jesus Christ. Nowhere else, in my not-so-humble opinion, is the grace of a loving God told better through words and actions than at First Lutheran. We preach grace: undeserved love from God for ALL. All are welcome to worship. All are welcome to lead. All are welcome to commune. No one judges but God. And no one is said to be closer to God than anyone else. THIS IS RADICAL

Christopher believes we need to move from a mindset of telling people, "you should give" to answer the question our donors are asking us, "Why should I give to YOU?"

- STUFF! Grace is a concept our kids encounter NOwhere else. "All are welcome" in very few places in this world. If for no other reason, give to First Lutheran because of its extremely important message.
- 2. First Lutheran changes lives... by saying, 'yes' to outside groups looking for space. Our buildings not only include a house of worship (where all are welcome... did I mention that?) but host grief groups, addiction recovery meetings, parenting support classes, divorce support, earlyonset dementia support, cancer survivor support, scouts and so much more. Yes. First Lutheran seeks to serve its own members. But just as important to our membership is that we serve our neighbors by opening our doors to outside groups who simply need a place to meet.
- 3. First Lutheran changes lives... by meeting the needs of our neighbors both near and far. Our Teen Clothes Closet at Trinity will serve hundreds of kids in our area, providing dignity and warmth where there wasn't any before. Our quilters sent off 202 auilts to Lutheran World Relief that will offer a physical reminder to people in need that they are not alone. First Lutheran supports education for elders in our county who are considering how to complete advanced directives. We make significant contributions toward local food banks that feed the hungry. We support Lutheran Social Services, which serves the whole state. We even buy gifts for families unable to celebrate Christmas as we hope their kids can enjoy. First Lutheran may not receive a lot of publicity for it and perhaps our own members

- take it for granted, but our church changes lives near and far through a variety of Christcentered ministries.
- 4. First Lutheran changes lives...
  through fellowship, food and fun.
  Where else do babies, teens, their
  parents, grandparents, singles,
  widows, elders, gay & straight,
  Republican & Democrat, wealthy
  and poor all meet to do ANYthing?
  We are intergenerational in ways
  no other institution can be. We
  mix people in ways they mix in no
  other time or place. First Lutheran
  challenges beliefs, stretches
  stubborn hearts and, with genuine
  care, comforts those who are
  suffering.

I could say more, but maybe you are starting to get the point. First Lutheran is worthy of your generosity. It is a special place. Of course, it is most assuredly imperfect. I know where most of the cracks are and. sadly, I have been one who has done some of the cracking. But none of us pretend First is without blame or blemish. In fact, our willingness to claim our imperfection, to admit we are still becoming hopefully expresses our humility. This is a special time in the life of this particular congregation. As a new program year begins and as the capital campaign continues to receive donations, I pray you have a couple answers to your question, "why should I give to First?"





#### FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT





The following is a financial summary through the end of August:

Actual receipts -\$487,731.43

Budgeted receipts -\$517,550.00

Actual expenses -\$507,532.73

Budgeted expenses -\$547,043.00

Our total receipts through the end of August fell short of the current year budgeted amount by \$29,818.57. Our total giving (general fund and other miscellaneous offerings) fell short of our current year budgeted amount by \$26,559.34 or 6.1%. In addition, our total receipts through the end of August are

less than of our total receipts through the same period last year by \$8,980.46 or 1.8%.

As noted above, our expenses are less than budgeted through the end of August by \$39,510.27. A portion of this favorable variance is due to the timing of certain expenses.

In summary, we budgeted for a deficit of \$29,493.00 through the end of August and have realized an actual deficit of \$19,801.30.

In addition to the above noted operating receipts and expenses we received \$13,243.66 for our capital campaign in August and incurred expenses associated with our capital campaign of \$5,138.37. Cumulative receipts and expenses associated with our capital campaign through the

end of August are \$405,303.12 and \$203,276.78, respectively.

As always, full details of this report are available by request in the church office. Also, everyone is welcome to attend a finance committee meeting—we meet every month, on the second Wednesday, at noon in the Thomas Room.

We are told to "fear and love God." We are also told "fear not." I think both are possible.

beginning of wisdom." "You are to fear and love the Lord so that...." What about all this fear? I think the notion of fearing a loving God is confusing. How can fear, which feels oppressive, be part of God's life-giving relationship with us? Are we to fear, or fear not? And yet, there it is. In Scripture and in the catechism, we are told to "fear and love God." We are also told "fear not." I think both are possible.

There is a lot of fear going around in our world, our country and our church. The evidence is all around: heavily armed police and military personnel at airports; the strident fearmongering that blares at us from media outlets of the left and the right; the possibility of nuclear war; even manufactured threats about personal hygiene (do we have the whitest, brightest teeth?).

This kind of fear makes the world seem chaotic and overwhelming. It drives us into smaller and smaller relationships. It's limiting and inhibiting. This kind of fear plays to our sinful nature, particularly sin as defined by Martin Luther: "the soul curved in upon itself." This kind of fear puts us in the center of a limited universe that is restricting and life-destroying. That is why this kind of fear is an effective means of control.

The fear of God that is found in Scripture and the catechism is the opposite. The fear of God is actually part of an expansive and expanding existence. Instead of our crowded little worlds with us at the center, we are able to experience the depth and breadth of God's love. This kind of fear is about awe that makes us tremble in the presence of God's power expressed in love. The absence of fear and awe makes God, the cosmos and the world small, impoverished and parochial.

Here is how I think it is possible for us to fear and fear not. If we fear and love God, if we assume an attitude of awe, we are set free. Rather than being limiting, this kind of fear is liberating. We are liberated from futile attempts to save ourselves. We are liberated from exhausting attempts to justify ourselves. This kind of fear is the best response to the constricting and lifedestroying fear that the world peddles. It is not denying that the world can be a frightening and dangerous place. Rather, the fear and awe of God make it possible to face real threats with the confidence that this is God's world— God's redeemed world.

Listen to God's promise: "When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior" (Isaiah 43:2-3).

#### HOSPITALITY HARVEST



This summer, I had the wonderful opportunity to host my step-mom for a couple of days. I so looked forward to her coming. I made sure the quest

room was ready with clean sheets, a new pillow and space in the closet in case she needed to hang anything up. I loved getting the room ready in anticipation of her coming. We had a wonderful time together and not long after her return home, I received a thank you note from her. Because of my preparation we had a great time together, she felt welcomed and loved.

Here at church we also have prepared for visitors through the welcome center being staffed, having visitor packets to give out and following up with connection cards. Even with these in place, we still must wait for visitors to come to us. But what if we didn't wait for the visitor to come to us at the welcome center or wait for a card to be filled out. What if we made an effort to see those who we are unfamiliar with and graciously make contact with them. This is fairly easy to do: When you see someone you don't know, ask if they need any help, introduce yourself to them, invite them to sit with you in worship. When we take the time to notice those around us, we will see who our visitors are and then we are able to connect with them and help them feel welcomed here.

I would love to have several people or a family doing this in the narthex each Sunday. Their job will be to look around and see who looks lost, who needs help with something, who looks uncertain about coming into church or who they are unfamiliar with. The best part of making connections with

people is that you can stand and be anywhere in the narthex. Your lookout point may be near the welcome center, over by the name tags or between the front and sanctuary doors just mingling around. This is what we are missing in our hospitality ministry: minglers who will welcome not only our visitors but also our regular attenders. We need minglers who will focus on people coming into the narthex and see if they need assistance or look unfamiliar and may be a visitor.

Our hospitality ministry would be complete with minglers around the narthex and even in the sanctuary to welcome and be a help to all who enter into our church. I would love to reap a harvest of hospitality, connecting with visitors in person, introducing them to the welcome center staff and giving them a visitor packet. Our church would then be a more welcoming place. I will not grow weary in trying to get minglers in the narthex and sanctuary. As it says in Galatians 6:9, "So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up." I will keep praying and looking for those God will place in front of me, to be minglers. When we create a place filled with hospitality, we will reap a harvest of welcome.



The desire to meet where they can "have a safe place to talk, like our confirmation small groups were... where all are welcome" came from the high schoolers themselves. It's pretty fantastic! Teesha Willinger, who helped teach many of them Peer Ministry is their adult leader, but the kids aren't afraid to take the lead either. I just wanted you to know, in case you didn't, that this ministry is blooming at First.
